## 2018 GRAND MARSHAL RONALD BRAY

Ron Bray was born and raised in Eureka, Utah. He attended the local schools in Eureka; Eureka Elementary and Tintic High School. Ron married his sweetheart Gertie Ann (Hannifin) Bray in 1960. Together they raised their three children Patricia (Wahlberg), Mary Ann (Allinson), Ronnie Bray here in Eureka. All three children graduated from Tintic High School and local Universities. Patricia and Mary Ann still live in Eureka, Ronnie resides in West Jordan. Ron is the proud grandpa of seven granddaughters, one great grandson, three great granddaughters, soon to be four!

Ron began his mining career as a young man working alongside his dad George Bray.

He started working in the Chief Consolidated #2 mine in 1957 and later went on to work in many of the local mines including; the Bullion Beck,

Mammoth, Burgan, Water Lily, Quart Side Pit, Iron Blossom, Blue Rock, Apex and the Trixie Mine. Ron also worked for several other mining companies outside of the Tintic Mining District during his time mining.

May 2nd of this year marked the 46th anniversary of one of the worst mining disasters in U.S. history. In 1972, a fire broke out underground at the Sunshine Mine in Kellogg, Idaho; 91 men died of carbon monoxide poisoning. Ron and fellow co-workers were among the nearly 100 trained rescue personnel from seven other mines in the U.S. and Canada to assist with the rescue and recovery of the Sunshine miners.

After 35 years of mining Ron retired from Sunshine Mining Company as a General Mine Foreman. Ron loves to share his stories, memories of friends and experiences with friends and family. He is proud of his mining days.

Ron was a member of the Tintic School Board of Education and the Snow College South School Board for 18 years. He served on the Eureka City Council for a short time as well.

Ron owned and operated Ron's Service from 1984-2017. After 33 years of operating a successful business he retired from being a mechanic. He enjoys living in Eureka and visiting with his family and friends. He still loves hunting, fishing, watching the wildlife, and rides in his side by side.

Ron loves the rich mining history of this beautiful little town and has always been proud to be from Eureka!

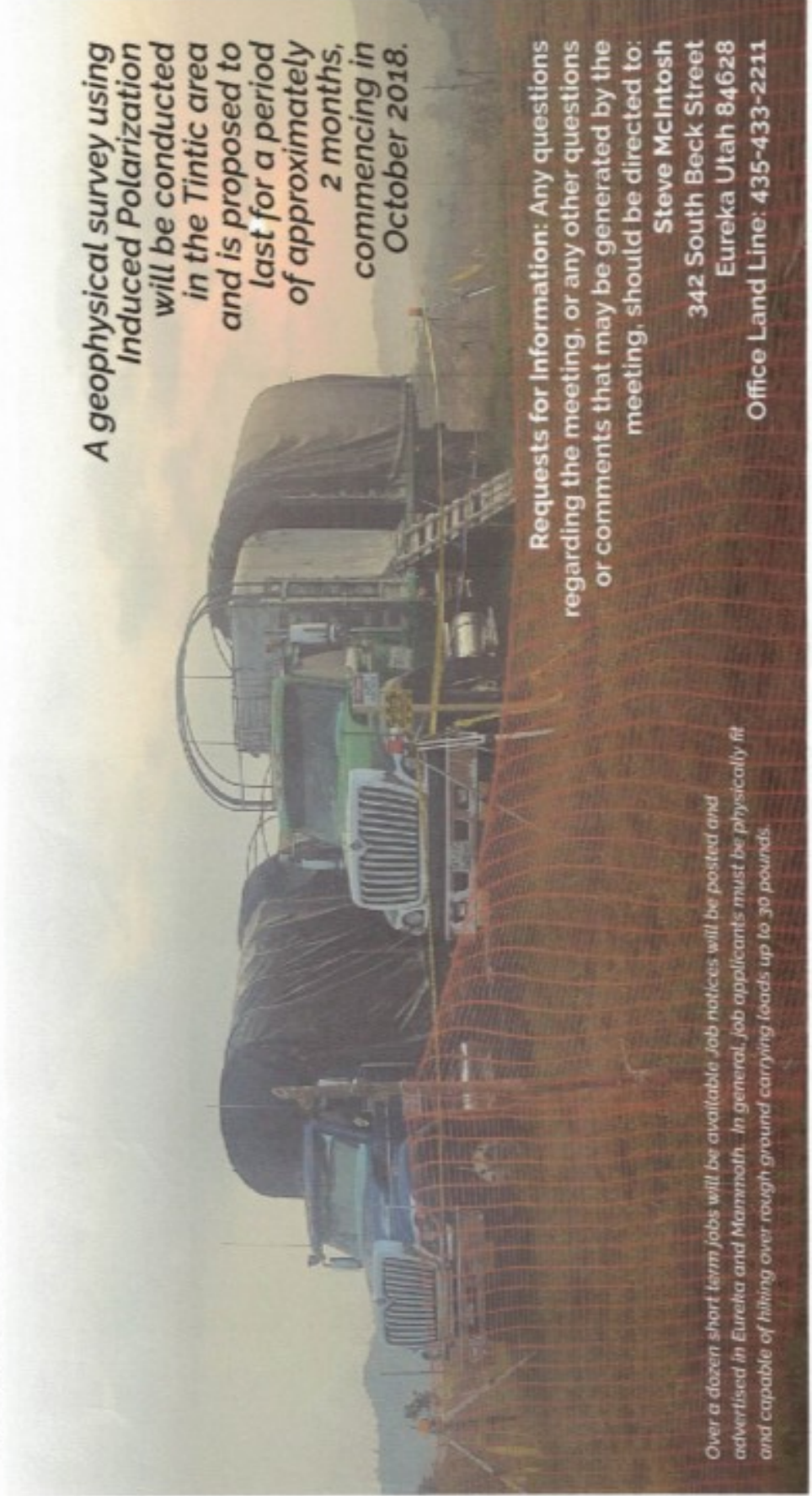

**James Arnold Greenhalgh**

James Arnold Greenhalgh, age 82, passed away September 3, 2018 at his home in Elberta, Utah

Jim was born in Salt Lake City, Utah on August 4, 1936 to parents Elva Allred and Sylvan Booth Greenhalgh. He was raised in Elberta, Utah but spent time in his early years in Eureka, Utah. Jim attended school in Goshen, Utah and graduated from Payson High School in 1954. During the summers he worked at Dugway Proving Grounds, and attended music camps at BYU. He started attending BYU in 1958 and spent a lot of time with music. Jim played the tuba in the marching band, the concert band and the symphony orchestra. He

served a mission in the Western States mission. After coming home he joined the Utah National Guard and his unit was called up during the Berlin crisis. While serving, he met Karen Farnsworth at a dance in Dugway and later, on February 13, 1960, married her in the Manti LDS Temple.

Jim drove the Utah State Bookmobile in Tooele and San Juan counties. He also directed the beautiful libraries in Monticello and Blanding. After getting a bachelor's degree from BYU in teaching, he taught school in Santaquin, Utah. He then went back to BYU and received a Masters degree in Library science. After receiving his Masters degree Jim accepted a library job for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Fort Worth, Texas. He then accepted a library job at Edgewood Arsenal in Maryland. After a few years in Maryland he worked for the Mine Safety and Health Administration in Denver, Colorado.

Jim retired from government service in Denver in August 1996. Then, he and Karen moved back to his hometown, Elberta, Utah. Jim has had the opportunity to serve in various church callings. In 2017, he was diagnosed with cancer and was challenged with this disease. Jim is survived by his wife Karen, their six wonderful sons; Brent (Laureen), Jeff, Brian, Mike (Maureen), Wayne (Johanna), and Phillip (Teri); 20 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Friday, September 7, 2018 at 11:00 am at the Elberta, Utah LDS Church where friends may call from 9:30 to 10:45 am prior to services. Interment will be in the Goshen City Cemetery.

### *Facts about Building Permits and Business Licenses*

Eureka City has adopted Ordinances regarding both Building Permits and Business Licenses. These Ordinances as well as many others are in place, for the most part, to protect the general health and welfare of the citizens of Eureka.

There are fees associated with both building permits and business licenses. Portions of these fees, especially the Building Permit Fees do not generally stay in the City Funds, they in turn must be paid out for the building inspector's fees, state fees, etc. as well as to help cover the day to day operating costs of the city itself including the upkeep of our parks, city buildings, streets, etc. Businesses, both in-home and commercial, bring in sales tax revenue which is also vital to the day to day operations of the city.

When citizens do not obtain permits or licenses, thinking they don't need one, not only are they putting themselves at risk, but their family, friends and neighbors as well.

Eureka City has noticed, or have been made aware of, some activity around town recently concerning new construction or remodeling as well as citizens selling products or services out of their homes. The products are both homemade and manufactured, and the services being offered range from house cleaning, painting, construction, day care, and others. Some of these are regulated by the State as well.

So, if you or someone you know, is engaged in building, remodeling, or repairing or replacing anything on or in your home; or if you or someone you know, is selling any type of products, please contact the City Office or visit our website [eurekautah.org](http://eurekautah.org), to find out if what you are doing requires a permit or a license. Not everything requires a permit or license, so it never hurts to check first before you build or do business.

Eureka City will be following up on the ones we are aware of, and if the situation is not taken care of within a reasonable time after contact, may result in fines which are established by each ordinance.
